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“WILD ABOUT EYES” KIOSK TO BE HELD AT REYNOLDS CORNER BRANCH LIBRARY

TOLEDO – To stress the importance of good eye health and safety to children, Kathy Holmes, a registered nurse with the Toledo- Lucas County Health Department, will read to children on Tuesday, April 15, 2008 from 7p.m.-8p.m.at the Reynolds Corner Branch Library in Toledo. Joining Kathy are Michael Seay and Dr. Shelly McCoy Grissom, Prevent Blindness Ohio volunteers, to help with activities. Their appearance is in conjunction with Prevent Blindness Ohio’s **Wild About Eyes** educational kiosk tour which is on display at the library from March 27 through April 24.

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The **Wild About Eyes** kiosk provides four learning stations providing hands-on, interactive vision experiences for children and adults. Using bowling balls, hand held paddles that simulate eye diseases and an eye safety matching game, the kiosk lets participants see for themselves how the eye works.

Wild About Eyes was developed by Prevent Blindness Ohio and the Boonshoft Museum of Discovery in Dayton. It is funded by the Ohio Department of Health, Bureau of Child and Family Health Services and the Save Our Sight Program. The Save Our Sight Fund is supported by \$1 donations at the time of motor vehicle registration to support eye health and safety programs for kids www.saveoursight.org.

Vision problems affect one in four school-age children and one in twenty preschoolers. Eighty percent of what a child learns is visual – good vision is critical to learning. Undetected vision problems can affect how well a child performs in the classroom. An estimated 47,300 Ohio preschool children (1 in 20) have a vision disorder including amblyopia (lazy eye) and strabismus (crossed eyes) that can lead to loss of vision. Many eye problems in children can be effectively treated and corrected if diagnosed early. Prevent Blindness Ohio recommends a continuum of eye care for children to include both vision screening and comprehensive eye examinations. All children, even those with no signs of trouble, should have their eyes checked at regular intervals.
