

Americans are living longer than ever before. On average, life expectancy in the United States is nearly 79 years, compared to 49 years a century ago. Age-related eye diseases pose a real threat to self-sufficiency and independence.

Did you know...

- Half of all American will develop **cataracts** by age 80. About 20.5 million Americans age 40 and older have cataracts.
- Between 40 to 45 percent of Americans diagnosed with diabetes have some stage of **diabetic retinopathy**. Diabetics are more likely to develop glaucoma and cataracts than those without diabetes.
- More than 2 million Americans age 40 and older suffer from **glaucoma**. Nearly half do not realize that they have the disease.
- **Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD)** may account for up to 30 percent of all bilateral blindness among Caucasian Americans. AMD is a leading cause of blindness in people age 50 and older.
